Halls Donate 7th Property Easement to NOHLC

Tom and Loraine Hall put land conservation easements on their property in 7 different installments. There is a reason for that ...

Tom and Loraine Hall found a way for a middle class family to establish a land legacy for the future without present day financial hardship. What was their secret? Careful planning and good legal and tax advice. There was one other important ingredient - a commitment to the cause of land preservation.

Tom and Loraine moved to their beautiful hilltop north of Clarkston in 1965. Deer and other wildlife abounded and neighbors were far away. Soon after, development surrounded their home and they began to think of a way to save its natural character.




Starting in 1990 Tom had the land surveyed and divided into parcels. The parcels, with conservation easements, were then donated to NOHLC a few acres at a time. The Halls have been able to claim a federal tax donation on the property which has


been appraised at considerable value. The township may reduce the property taxes consistent with the remainder value after the easement.

The Halls still maintain control over their land and, by choice, invite the neighborhood to stroll the pathways they built. A lookout bench was established at the summit, the highest point in Oakland County where, on a clear day, you can see 60 miles to Detroit.

The Halls latest donation is just over five acres and it connects the prior easements and assures public access from the wetlands at the bottom of the hill to the crest some 112' above. NOHLC applauds their long-range vision which will become their legacy far into the future.

Boy Scouts Help Out at the Hall Preserve

In November 2010 **Boy Scout Troop #185** completed their Eagle Scout service project at the Hall Preserve. Two wooden benches were installed at scenic overlooks, including the highest elevation in Oakland County which is part of the Hall property. They also delineated trails by lining them with logs, removed an obsolete silt fence that had been abandoned for decades, cut down and removed invasive shrubs and installed signs indicating that the property is protected by NOHLC. Signs were also hung memorializing James Hall, the son of Tom & Loraine Hall. The service project was organized and led by Eagle Scout David Duthinh. The Halls had been very involved in scouting when their sons were young.





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Michigan's First True Natural Burial Cemetery

The Preserve at All Saints Cemetery introduces true natural burial to Michigan.

The land is left in its natural state, with mowed paths to invite visitors in. Only biodegradable materials are allowed and fieldstones from the prairie mark loved ones' graves.

North Oakland Headwaters Land Conservancy supports the concepts and principles of preservation in this endeavor including the use of native plants, natural grave markers, biodegradable containers and other eco-friendly procedures.

Members of the Conservancy who choose to support natural burial at The Preserve, will be given \$100 off the cost of a grave when pre-arranging before January 31.
